# Watch one-act plays at ACT

Abilene Community Theatre is trying something new next weekend. It's "An Evening of One-Acts," which will be presented three times.

Four one-act plays will be performed at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, March 20 and 21, at ACT, 809 Barrow St.

The plays include "Superhero Support Group,' about a bunch of superheroes and a doctor who can change their lives; "The Philadelphia," about a man stuck in a Twilight Zone-type state; "Le Pigeon Aux Petits Pois," a living-room caper

revolving around the Pablo Picasso painting of the same title that was stolen and never recovered; "The Indian Wants the Bronx," about a man from India, newly moved to New York, and two punks who harass him.

McCarthy told him he was crazy, but set it up, Walsh said in a phone interview from Cambridge, Massachusetts, where he is now an admissions officer at Harvard University.

Walsh joined a middle school class and sat in the back of the room for a couple of weeks. Then, the teacher turned the class over to Walsh, telling him, "You're the drama teacher now."

"Nine months later, we had a show," Walsh said. "The kids were wonderful."

The play was conceived and written to be performed by middle school students for middle school students.

The HSU production will be a bit different.

Walsh and Smoot have been in contact, and rewrites and adjustments are almost a constant process. Walsh said that after a conversation with Smoot last weekend, an entire song was removed from the show. He said it was the right decision.

'It was great to work on it with him," Smoot said. "He's very open and a really talented writer."

Smoot and his cast have been working hard to take "Bullies" from a workshop piece to a fully staged musical.

"The cast of 13 never leaves the stage," Smoot said. "The set is very stark." Thirteen wooden chairs are used throughout the play as props for the actors.

Instead of the original middle school setting, the play now is set at a prep school, complete with preppy blazers. This makes the characters older and means that they won't be judged by what they are wearing.

The music includes pop, rap, rock and Broadwaystyle tunes.

Two bullies roam the halls of this particular prep school. Each has a specific target, who is picked on

constantly. Senior Branden Loera takes on the role of Brady Barlow, a bully. Bringing a character to life, especially

a bully, can be a challenge. "It's really hard not to go the clichéd route," Loera said. "It's a good experience."

The path of a bully often can be traced to his home life, as it is in the case of Brady. His father berates him and talks down to him, which Brady turns around and does to his victim.

"I don't think he gets any joy in it," Loera said of his character.

Freshman Fabian Carrisalez plays Joshua, Brady's victim. But Joshua isn't the typical victim, according to the young actor.


"He's actually outgoing and likes to be around people," Carrisalez said.

He said he was able to pull from his own experiences as a child to breathe life into Joshua. He was raised by a single mother and got picked on a lot.

'I was always nice," Carrisalez said. "I always hid my anger inside. I take all those thoughts onstage."

The subject matter might feel heavy, but there's more to the show than that.

"The play sounds dark and serious. It's not a musical comedy," Smoot said. "But there are some humorous moments."


